
The pencil





It was a short, usually very thin pencil, often with a pastel-coloured coating. Many times it came with coloured cords and tassles.

The ladies took the ball pens with them when they went dancing. They could attach small cards to the cords. They used the pens to write down with whom they had danced during the night.

In the past, the pencil industry did not use the decimal system. Instead, pencil quantities were given in "Gros". Today it's called a bulk pack. A "Gros" consists of 144 pencils – 12 x 12.

A Gros used to be a common unit of quantity: a dozen x a dozen. Traders who used to sell larger quantities were referred to as wholesalers.






A standard pencil is

175 mm long.











In 2009, STAEDTLER succeeded in developing a completely new product with WOPEX. This revolutionized the process of producing pencils.

Unlike traditional pencils, WOPEX pencils are not made by gluing wooden slats together. Instead, they are made in one pour. Various granulates are melted down and pressed into a pencil strand. WPC is used as the granulate for the pencil body, an innovative material that is largely made from wood. This raw material comes from PEFC-certified German forests, that are managed sustainably.
